Safe Trick-or-Treating

The Frisco Police Department is committed to providing a safe environment for the city's citizens to celebrate Halloween. The Frisco Police Department has put together these tips to allow the children of the city to enjoy a happy AND safe Halloween.



Top 10 Safety Tips for Halloween

- 10. NEVER let children trick-or-treat alone.
- **9.** Do not enter houses; only accept candy in the doorway.
- 8. Try to finish trick-or-treating before dark, and carry a flashlight just in case.
- **7.** Make sure all pets (particularly dogs) are secured indoors. A costumed child may frighten a pet causing it to become aggressive or bite.
- 6. Plan your route and make sure your family knows where you are.
- 5. Only visit houses of people you know and are comfortable with.
- **4.** Choose a costume that is flame retardant/resistant.
- 3. Make sure masks, wigs and head coverings do not obstruct the child's vision.
- 2. Make sure the costumes are easily seen by motorists and short enough to eliminate the danger of tripping.
- 1. Children should NEVER eat candy until parents have inspected it. If in doubt about the safety of the candy, DO NOT eat it!



Website Updates

The Communications Committee is always striving to provide information in a timely manner as well as make it easier for people get involved in Grayhawk and find neighbors with similar interests. We now have nearly 800 residents registered on the website. It should be noted that while information shown in the Resident Directory is visible only to registered residents of Grayhawk, not all of the users choose to show their information in the Resident Directory.

Here are some examples of the latest additions to our website with more to come:

FAQ— Frequently Asked Questions to the Board and Committees will be posted in this area to help people find answers quickly to common questions.

Message Board Email Notification—In late July we added this functionality to the Message Board. In order to get email sent every time a new message is posted to the message board, simply click on the '**Subscribe**' button at the top of the Message Board. Posting new messages and replying to previous posts still requires logging in to the website and cannot be handled through email.

Grayhawk Groups—If you have a group or social gathering and you would like to extend an invitation out to the residents of Grayhawk please send your information to the Communications Committee.

Grayhawk Business Directory—Connecting residents to businesses that are located in or owned by someone living in Grayhawk.

Helping Hands—Dedicated section of the website used by the Helping Hands Committee to coordinate volunteers to assist residents during their time of need in life events such as the birth of a new baby, illness or death in the family.

Grayhawk Schools (*Coming Soon***)**—We will be working with the surrounding schools to better incorporate them into our community and provide them an avenue for communicating news and events to everyone in Grayhawk.

Committee Updates

Architectural Control Committee (ACC)— To get the Request for Home Improvement or Architectural Approval form contact SBB or print the forms from the HOA website documents section.

Note: Typical approval time frames are approximately 7 days.

Communications Committee— Continually maintaining and updating the Grayhawk HOA website to provide the latest HOA related news and information. Nearly 800 users have registered for access on the website in just the first 4 months, representing nearly half of all of the current homes in Grayhawk. The more residents that register on the website, the easier it will be to communicate through email when time sensitive important information needs to be disseminated quickly.

New features have been added to the site that residents should find helpful. Some of those features include email notification of new messages posted to the message board as well as a dedicated page for the Helping Hands Committee. The Classified Ads section of the website has been updated to allow photos to be added to ads, reflect when new ads are posted, and categorizing of the ads for easier readability. A Grayhawk Business Directory is now available where those that own businesses here in Grayhawk can list their business for the residents of Grayhawk to see.

Safety / Crime Watch Committee— After evaluation of several companies, we have submitted recommendations to the HOA Board of Directors for a keycard access and camera system for the two pools. We are also working with the City on issues involving the pedestrian tunnel.

Everyone is encouraged to participate in National Night Out the evening of Oct 7th. This night is set aside every year to bring neighbors together and let criminals know that we are empowered and informed. We also continually strive to encourage active participation in the Frisco Neighborhood Watch Program.

Social Committee— Coordinating and organizing events through the remainder of 2008. Those events include:

Organic Grass Killing for Planting Beds



If you are like most Grayhawk homeowners, there are a few areas in your yard you want to improve. Maybe it's a planting bed for tulips, a tough spot to mow you'd just as soon mulch, or some decorative beds in the front yard area. But how do you get rid of that lush carpet of grass? Digging the sod may be an option, but it also removes topsoil you may need for planting. Harsh chemical killers do the job, but are

not always satisfactory and often take several weeks of ugly browning and reapplication.

Using newspaper and mulch is a surprisingly effective and nutritious way to get a beautiful plant bed. Simply mark off the bed using edging. Mow or trim the existing grass as short as possible. Then lay down newspaper with overlapping sections to a depth of about ¼ to ½ inch. A watering can to wet the paper and bucket of mulch to lay over the top will keep it from blowing away. Finish with mulch a couple inches deep. The paper covering kills the grass and decomposes into the soil as organic mulch (don't worry about the inks, they're mostly nontoxic soy now). The entire process will take a few weeks, and you may need to repaper some areas, but you'll have a great planting bed! Just punch through where you want to plant and voila!

Road Construction Updates

State Projects

FM 2934/Eldorado Parkway (FM 423 – DNT) – Project to widen the existing two lane road to a six lane urban roadway with curb and gutter. TxDOT bid the project in February 2008, and construction is expected to begin in September, pending relocation of utilities. Franchise utility companies continue to work on finishing the relocation of facilities along Eldorado ahead of a September start date. Construction is expected to take 26 months, but the contractor is analyzing ways to improve upon the original schedule.

FM 423 (SH 121 – US 380) – Project to widen the existing two lane road to a six lane urban roadway with curb and gutter. Environmental clearance (FONSI) for the Middle and North Sections was received on July 7, 2006, and ROW acquisition will be conducted by TxDOT in accordance with the SH 121 Memorandum of Understanding.

<u>North Section (Eldorado – US 380)</u> – Staff completed review of the 95% plans on July 2, 2008. Design is expected to be completed in January 2009. The north section is scheduled to be bid by TXDOT in early 2010, or upon completion of ROW acquisition and utility relocation. Construction is anticipated to require 24 months.

<u>Middle Section (Stewart Creek – Eldorado)</u> – Jacobs Carter Burgess has submitted 100% plans to the District for final review. Right of Way acquisition is approximately 50% complete. . Coordination with the utility companies continues as they have been requested to submit completed Utility Packages by June 2008. The middle section is scheduled to be bid by TXDOT in August 2009, or upon completion of ROW acquisition and utility relocations. Construction is anticipated to require 24 months.

City Projects

Panther Creek Parkway (DNT – Teel) and Legacy Drive - This project constructed 4 lanes of arterial street in a location where no roadway existed to provide traffic relief for Eldorado Parkway. Construction began in January 2008 and Panther Creek Parkway was opened for traffic on July 2, 2008. Crews have completed subgrade stabilization of Legacy Drive and paving began on August 6, 2008. Substantial completion of Legacy Drive is anticipated in September

Teel Parkway (Panther Creek Parkway to North of Little River) – Project to construct the two northbound lanes widening the roadway to four lanes. This project is jointly funded by FISD. Construction began in May 2008. Utilities have been installed and subgrade preparation has begun. Poor weather eliminated the possibility of completing pavement prior to school starting in August 2008. Rodman Excavating is focused on finishing the roadway in early September and minimizing the impact to FISD. Project completion is anticipated in November 2008.

Panther Creek / Legacy (Traffic Signal) - This signal is expected to be complete next month.

Landscaping Tips to Help Prevent Crime

How can landscaping help prevent crime? Certainly, landscaping cannot prevent all crime, but it is the first layer of defense to your home or business. By making an exterior inhospitable to criminals, you can decrease your chances of becoming the next victim. First and foremost, do not provide a hiding place or shelter for intruders: trees should be trimmed to a minimum height of 6 feet, shrubs should be no taller than 3 feet and the area surrounding the structure should not be overgrown.



Borders, paths and fences also play a psychological role in preventing unwanted individuals from encroaching on your property. Borders help define private property from common areas. As borders are crossed, the risk for the criminal increases.

Lights! Criminals do not want to be seen. Effective lighting is essential and also forms a border around your property. Ideally, lighting would be motion sensitive to only people on your property, not to cars just passing by. Of course, be considerate: security lights should only illuminate your property, not your neighbor's.

Securing your home or business involves layers of defense. Those layers can be aesthetically pleasing and functional at the same time.

Simple Vehicle Burglary Prevention Tips

Here are some simple vehicle burglary prevention tips to follow that may help keep you, your family, friends or neighbors from becoming a victim. These steps should be used whenever and wherever you park your vehicle, whether you are just "running in for a minute" or parking for the evening.

- **ALWAYS** close your windows, lock your vehicle and garage doors an open or unlocked window/garage door is an invitation to a criminal and an easy target.
- Park in well lit areas close to the building or if at home in the garage (always the best option).
 If you must park in your driveway utilize (or install) floodlights installed above/around your garage set on a motion detector to illuminate your driveway, as this will help discourage a Burglar (lighting is one of the best property crime deterrents).
- ALWAYS remove loose valuables from your vehicle including the garage door opener.
